

WINDSOR COUNTRY GOLF CLUB - TEMPORARY LOCAL RULES

Penalty for Breach of a Local Rule unless otherwise specified in the Local Rules or the applicable Rule: General Penalty under the applicable Rule.

E-1.2 GUR in Fairway Abutting Rough. When a player's ball is in a GUR in a part of the general area cut to fairway height or less and the GUR abuts the rough, the player may take free relief under Rule 16.1 Abnormal Course Conditions at:

- The nearest point of complete relief reference point, or
- A deemed nearest point of complete relief reference point on the fairway side of the GUR.

E-3.1 Preferred Lies (fairways only). When a player's ball lies in a part of the general area cut to fairway height or less, the player may take free relief once by placing the original ball or another ball in and playing it from this relief area:

- Reference Point: Spot of the original ball.
- Size of Relief Area Measured from Reference Point: 30cm from the reference point, but with these limits:
- Limits on Location of Relief area:
 - o Must not be nearer the hole than the reference point, and
 - o Must be in the general area.

F-4.1 Bare Patches. Bare patches greater in size than 10 cm x 15 cm (the size of a closed scorecard) in a part of the general area cut to fairway height or less are GUR. The player may take relief under Rule 16.1b Abnormal Course Conditions.

Note 1: A divot is not a bare patch.

Note 2: Areas containing the completely dead remains of vegetation are considered to be bare for the purposes of this Local Rule.

F-9.1 Exposed Tree Roots If a player's ball is in the general area and there is interference from exposed tree roots that are in a part of the general area cut to fairway height or less, or in the rough within two club-lengths of the edge of an area cut to fairway height or less, the tree roots are treated as GUR. The player may take free relief under *Rule 16.1b Relief for Ball in General Area*.

But interference does not exist if the tree roots only interfere with the player's stance.

F-24 Weed Eradication If a player's ball lies in or touches turf damage known or virtually certain to have been caused by poisoning of paspalum, couch or other weeds, or such damage interferes with a player's intended swing:

- (a) Ball in General Area cut to fairway height or less The player may take relief under *Rule 16.1b*.
- (b) Ball on Putting Green The player may take relief under *Rule 16.1d*.

But interference does not exist if the turf damage only interferes with the player's stance.

F-25 Green Patching. Patches where cut turf has been installed on the green which have not yet recovered to the extent of making a seamless connection to the existing green are GUR. Relief is available if the condition interferes with the stroke or the line of play under Rule 16.1 Abnormal Course Conditions.

- Reference Point: Spot of the original ball.
- Size of Relief Area Measured from Reference Point: nearest point of complete relief
- Limits on Location of Relief area:
 - o Must not be nearer the hole than the reference point, and
 - o Must be on the green or in the general area.
- Method
 - o The ball must be placed not dropped.

In proceeding under this Local Rule, the player must choose a spot to place the ball and use the procedures for replacing a ball under *Rules 14.2b (2) How Ball Must Be Replaced and 14.2e What to Do If Replaced Ball Does Not Stay on Original Spot*.
